Comment

Only the facts

One of the best suggestions we have heard in a long time came from the National Catholic Social Action Con-ference. This highly respected organization has called upon the U.S. Justice Department to resolve the controversy over the strength of domestic communism.

Our national unity is threatened by a bitter dispute between those who hold that the chief communist threat is from subversion within and those who say no, communish has been licked on the home front, the real threat is communist penetration into South America, Africa and Asia.

Why should this dangerous controversy be permitted to continue when a few facts from people in the government could resolve it?

Those who have the facts have not hesitated to speak about them unofficially. Mr. William Sullivan, Assistant Director of the F.B.L., has on several occasions stated from public platforms that communism has greatly diminished here in the U.S. and that the principal communist threat is not from within but from without But a day or so after such a statement, another assistant director of the F.B. will be quoted in the press as warning the nation's youth against subversion by the communists.

against subversion by the communities.

Mr. J. Edgar Hoover himself can't quite make up his mind what the citizens ought to know. One day he says the F.B.1 has the communists under control and warms against the exaggerated fears of communist subversion; the next day he sounds the alarm and cries for more vigilance against the danger of infiltration.

In the June issue of Sign magazine, Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy warns that extreme right wing groups are not effective in fighting communism. The Attorney General, who is Mr. Hoover's boss, admits a drastic decline of communist power and influence in the U.S.

"Much of the decline is attributable to the excellent F.B.I. work over the years," Mr. Kennedy says. We believe these facts should be made public. We join with the National Catholic Social Action Conference in asking the Justice Department to make a factual and authoritative clarification of the present position of communism in the U.S. What is the estimated membership of the party, the number of communist front organizations active today, the extent of Red penetration into areas that affect public opinion, the communist success in special groups, such as youth, the clergy and minorities?

Is this asking too much?

Tax relief

By a new law passed in 1961, the State of Indiana now requires every tax-exempt institution to file a return of its real property every four years. In spile of arguments in its favor—that It goes out after properties having exemptions to which they are not entitled, for example—the law disturbs many Catholics, especially the clergy.

The uneasiness grows from public discussions which take the form of demanding the inclusion on tax rolls of religious institutions which, by American law and custom, have always been exempt.

We do not propose here to discuss the financial and tax-exempt status of other churches, but we might usefully draw attention to a few facts relevant to the position of the Catho-lic Church, in this archdiocese and in the state generally.

Unlike many other institutions, the Church has very little property not strictly related to its normal functions.

The Church pays full taxes on what little income-bearing property she owns, and she has been doing so for many

Indeed, in comparison with other institutions, it can be said the Church pays not less but more than its share of taxation. All the property of the Young Men's Christian Association, for example, is exempt from taxation, but the property of the Catholic Youth Organization, a similar but much less well endowed operation, is not, except in a very limited degree.

The Church's school system saves the public school system—and the taxpayer of Indiana—no less than \$50 million every year, a load of some \$300 a year on each Catholic family added to the taxation it pays for public education. The system is nothing else but a taxation on the Church, and a heavy one too.

heavy one too.

Instead of having "an accumulation of wealth," the Church in Indiana is "struggling to get along" just as much today as a hundred years ago. Its resources are now larger, today as a hundred years ago. Its resources are now larger, of course, but they do not cover its very much larger commitments. In the last fifteen years alone, for example, the Catholic population of Indiana has risen by 73 per cent. Indeed, were it not for the devoted self-sacrificing service of its priests and its Brothers and Sisters in religion the Church would not be able to carry on at all.

If the Church's tax liability were extended, however little, by any unforeseen quirk of legislation, its functions would be fatally compromised. It is obvious that any such development would seriously hurt the whole community, Protestant as well as Catholic. Furthermore, it is equally obvious there would be no relief at all for the taxpayer, but rather an increase of his burden.

Must convert make general confession?

By MSGR. J. D. CONWAY

Q. When a non-Catholic joins the Church does he have to make a general confession of all the sins of his past life, or does he just confess the sins he commits after Baptism?

A. If a convert has never been baptized there

A. If a convert has never been baptized uncle is no confession needed at the time he becomes a Catholie. He is received into the Church by Baptism, a sacrament which takes away all sim, and all punishments due for sin. Of course the convert must be honestly repentant for all his

sin. Of course the convert into the honesty repentant for all his sins to be nonestly repentant for all his sins of the convert into the Church someone who has been haptized in a Protestant church. The Roman Ritual directs us to find out for sure whether this Baptism actually took place, and whether or not it was validly baptized then we must not repeat the Baptism. This sacrament can be received only once, and anyone who has the right intention and uses the right methods can validly baptize. It matters not whether this Baptism was by immersion, pouring of water, or sprinkling. When a convert already validly baptized is received into the Church he must make a confession of all the sins he has committed since his Baptism—which may have been many years ago.

If our investigation shows that the previous Bap-

If our investigation shows that the previous Baptism was invalid then we simply baptize the convert and there is no confession. A Baptize might be invalid because of wrong intention on the part of either the minister or the recipient, but it because the convertions of the part of the control of the contro

This Baptism was invalid.

Most times when we try to investigate these previous Baptisms we remain a bit uncertain. In fact, after years of practice in receiving converts, our minds become conditioned to such uncertainty. And since investigations are usually inconclusive we fend to make them in most perfunctory manner. If the convert is willing we simply baptize him conditionally. When we pour the water we say explicitly: "John, if you are not baptized, I baptize you in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit."

In this case, since we don't really know which was the actual Baptism, the convert makes a confession of sins committed since the first Baptism—just to be sure. From my own investigations: I have acquired a conviction that most Baptisma conferred in the churches of traditional Protestantism are valid—especially those given by Episcopalians and Lutherans. The Congregation of the Holy Office a few years ago directed that we must presume the baptisms of Episcopalians, Lutherans, Methodists, Baptists, Presbyterians and the like, to be valid. Of course this general presumption gives way in the purse this general presumption gives way in the ice of facts which may be discovered in the in-estigation of a particular Baptism.

Because of this general presumption, I feel that my conditional Baptism probably does nothing to the soul of the convert at all, and that confession of sins is most probably a matter of obligation. So I advisa the convert—and in the confessional will help him—sins he can remember—but without excessive worry about details and numbers. The absolution I then give him will be conditional also: if the Baptism I just gave him took away all his sins then there are none left to be forgiven in confession. When we get through we may not be quite sure whether the Baptism or the sacrament of Penance was the instrument of forgiveness. This is a technicality which we leave to the good Lord who gave us both sacraments; as effective signs of His love and His grace.



POLAND SPRING, Maine—Cardinal Richard Cushing said here that "one-third of the children on earth are being trained, taught and brainwashed into atheists of the future."


