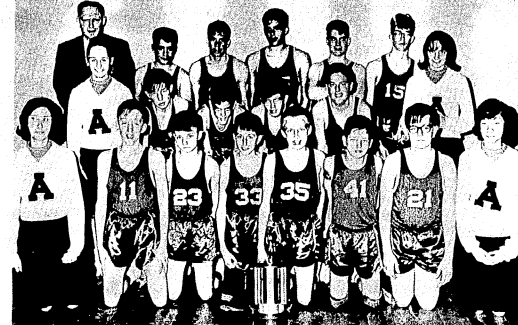

## Volunteers accepted for one-year terms

CHICAGO — Faced with a drastic shortage of lay volunteers for service in the home missions, Extension Volunteers is accepting recruits on a one-year term basis.

Previously, the home mission society has accepted only candidates who would agree to two-year terms. That policy is being changed because the recruitment rate has been off severely for many months and recently has upped more. Father John J. Sullivan, national director, said:

"WE STILL prefer volunteers who will promise two years of service," Father Sullivan said. "We can train them better and

they usually are at least 50% more effective in the second year, after they have learned the ropes of mission life."

However, applications will now be accepted in any category for one year with the option of staying on for a second. Volunteers serious as teachers, parish workers, campus workers, nurses, medical technicians, secretaries, social workers and inner-city community workers. Many persons with other skills may be accepted, Father Sullivan said.

VOLUNTEERS may be male or female, between 21 and 45, single or married without present dependents. College background is preferred, but not absolutely required. Training for new volunteers is scheduled to begin in July but applications should be filed by March 15, he said.

"The sad thing is that we may have to drop missions which are completely dependent on us," he said. They are Father Ferdinand Antonelli, O.F.M., secretary of the Congregation of Rites, and Msgr. Giacomo Vularado, secretary of the Congregation of Sacramental Discipline. They have been appointed titular archbishops of Idiera and Satis respectively.

Sex education talks draw vocal reaction

The impact of the dramatic call for an improved parental presentation of sex education remains in Indianapolis several days following the appearance of Dr. and Mrs. Jack Wilkie before 1,600 persons at Marian College.

The Cincinnati couple, parents of six youngsters, called in their office and expressed their disapproval...

DR. AND MRS. Frank Crumtyman, of 5633 Central Ave., voiced preference for increased parental control...

Comments were received this week by The Criterion from several Indianapolis sources, indicative of the ripple created by the Wilkie's frank appraisal of present efforts at sex education of young people.

DR. HENRY G. Nester, Director of Public Health for Indianapolis and Marion County, had praise for the Wilkie's appearance and message.

"From these statistics it is obvious that sex is being regarded as a form of entertainment rather than as a means to reproduction."

"Dr. and Mrs. Wilkie presented a desirable model of the proper relationship between husband and wife in marriage, and a desirable way in which to present the subject of the proper use of sex to children."

"I believe that if the example presented by Dr. and Mrs. Wilkie could be followed by parents as opposed to the great freedom of discussion and experience evidenced on such campuses as Bloomington and Berkeley...

MRS. ROBERT Hebenstreit, of 4130 Brown Road, Indianapolis, commented on the Wilkie's statement that "first impressions are lasting impressions."

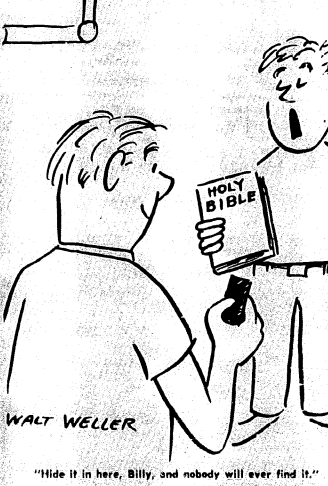

**Catechism 'bias' target of scholars**

**FRANKFURT, Germany**—Pro-many's Catholic hierarchy recently declared that in a spirit of ecumenism texts on the relation of Christ to the Jews was council it would rewrite catechism passages about Jews. At the conclusion of the meeting here it was agreed that two

classroom efforts could be stressed to help overcome bias against Jews. First, they said it should be brought out that Christ was Himself a member of the Jewish community, and second, they urged that the Old and New Testaments be pre-sented with greater unity.
